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Resources to provide to COVID-19 cases and close contacts

Summary

- Patients who are being tested for COVID-19 should be told they <u>must isolate at home</u> or some other setting where they will be separate from other individuals as much as possible while <u>waiting on their test results</u>.
- Patients who want <u>guidance on isolation</u> and <u>guarantine</u> prior to being contacted by DHEC should be directed to the resources available on the DHEC website.
- It is now recommended that asymptomatic close contacts of COVID-19 cases be tested. This should generally be done no sooner than seven (7) days into their quarantine period (seven (7) days after last contact with the case). Providers might consider special circumstances for testing sooner such as household contacts with prolonged contact to the case during their infectious period.

Background

Greater numbers of patients and their family members and close contacts are being tested. These individuals often want guidance before DHEC is able to contact them. Guidance regarding what to do while tests are pending or while patients await contact from DHEC after a positive test result are available on the DHEC COVID-19 website. Patients should be reminded to isolate until their test result is reported. They can review the guidance so they understand what to expect if told to isolate if their test is positive. They can begin identifying their close contacts (anyone with whom they were within six (6) feet for fifteen (15) minutes or more). Quarantine guidance is available for these individuals so they can also be prepared and begin prior to contact from DHEC.

Interim guidance on testing asymptomatic close contacts was provide in the DHEC <u>HAN</u> from June 19, 2020. Providers should generally not plan to test until at least seven (7) days into the contact's quarantine period. This is seven (7) days after last contact with the case. This is to prevent falsely negative results from a swab taken before the virus is detectable. Antibody testing is not appropriate for this. <u>Patients must be reminded to **complete their fully quarantine period even if the results are negative**, as the virus may not have gotten to a detectable level. Patients with positive results must be instructed to complete the isolation criteria for a positive case. Providers should use clinical judgement as to when to test before the seven (7) day period has elapsed. This may include household contacts with prolonged exposure to the case or with similar exposures that may put them at risk for infection. Patients and providers must consider the possibility of a false negative from testing too early. As always, close contacts with symptoms should also be tested with a PCR test.</u>

Recommendations

• Important guidance is available on the DHEC website and should be shared with patients and their families/close contacts to ensure that consistent, evidence-based guidance is being followed.
