# About This Report



This comprehensive report is a requirement of the S.C. Solid Waste Policy and Management Act of 1991 (Act) and must be submitted to the Governor and General Assembly annually by March 15.

Solid waste management (SWM) is the process associated with the generation, collection, transport, storage, treatment, disposal, and recovery of solid waste. The Act outlines specific data and information required in this report including:

- **The amount and type of solid waste disposed of, recycled, and incinerated by county;**
- **Identification of permitted solid waste management facilities and projection of remaining life of certain facilities;**
- **An estimate of current capacity to manage solid waste;**
- **The progress towards meeting the state’s waste reduction and recycling goals;**
- **Recommendations on improving solid waste management;** and
- **Revisions to the State Solid Waste Management Plan (State Plan) and an evaluation of progress made from the implementation of the State Plan.**

"The South Carolina Solid Waste Management Annual Report" (annual report) reflects SWM activities in fiscal year (FY) 2022 (July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022). During FY22, the S.C. Department

of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) updated the waste reduction and recycling goals to align with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) standards of recycling 50 percent of MSW and reduce the MSW disposal rate to 3.25 pounds per person per day (p/p/d) or less by the year 2030.

## What is measured?

The focus of this reporting is the measurement of two categories of solid waste.

1. **MSW** includes “everyday” items that are discarded from residential (i.e., single and multi-family homes), commercial (e.g., stores, office buildings, restaurants, hotels, groceries), institutional (e.g., schools, colleges/universities, government agencies, hospitals, military bases), and industrial sources (i.e., manufacturing). Items include:
  - **Containers and packaging** (e.g., aluminum, glass, plastic, cardboard, steel);
  - **Durable goods** (e.g., appliances, carpet, rugs, electronics, furniture);

2. **TSW** is comprised of all solid waste that is generated, disposed of, and recovered. MSW – as defined in the Act – offers a narrow view while TSW provides a more realistic picture. TSW includes:

- **Automobile bodies;**
- **Combustion ash;**
- **C&D debris;**
- **Industrial process waste** (i.e., scraps and by-products from manufacturing);

- **Land-clearing debris;**
- **MSW;**
- **Natural disaster debris;**
- **Processed waste tires;** and
- **Other material** (e.g., asbestos, contaminated soil, sludge, treated wood, manure).

Exported and imported waste is considered in the TSW totals. However, only tonnages from South Carolina counties are included in TSW recycling calculations. Therefore, when discussing TSW generation, only South Carolina tonnages are included.

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## Disclaimer

Every effort is made to ensure data accuracy. Any decisions on the use or omission of data were made with the goal of protecting the integrity of the report. Recycling tonnages are rounded to the nearest hundredth and disposal data is rounded to the nearest ton. Some totals do not equal 100 percent due to rounding. Data collection ended December 31, 2022. Any material reported after this date will be included in the FY23 report.

## Data Sources

The data in this report is collected from multiple sources.

- **Permitted solid waste facilities** are required to submit annual reports to DHEC on the amount of solid waste disposed of, incinerated, or exported. See sections 4 and 5 for more details.
- **County governments** are required to submit annual reports to DHEC on the amount and type of MSW recycled within their jurisdiction. Municipalities are encouraged, but not required, to report to DHEC or their county recycling coordinator.
- **State agencies and colleges/universities** are required to submit annual reports to DHEC on the amount and type of material recycled. This data is collected for a separate report but included in this publication and allocated to the county where the material was generated.
- **Businesses** (e.g., commercial, industrial) are encouraged, but not required, to report recycling data to DHEC or their county recycling coordinator.
- **S.C. Department of Commerce Recycling Market Development Team** provides data on capital investments in the state’s recycling industry.
- **U.S. Census Bureau** provides population data from its “QuickFacts.” The data used in this report reflects South Carolina’s population as of July 1, 2021. The annual estimates are predicted based on the current 10-year census count. Since the national census was conducted in 2020, the estimates are now based on 2020 data instead of 2010 data.

### Waste Reduction & Recycling Goals

By 2030, South Carolina’s goals are to:

1. **Reduce MSW disposal to 3.25 p/p/d or less;** and
2. **Recycle at least 50 percent of its MSW.**

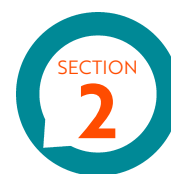

# Year at a Glance



For more than 30 years, the Act has provided the framework for South Carolina to safely and efficiently manage its solid waste in ways that protect human health, public safety, and the environment. This annual report is one of the primary requirements of the Act. Much of this report focuses on measurement of the amount, composition, and disposition of solid waste. Tracking this information provides essential data for local governments to plan, adjust, and sustain programs.

This report also measures TSW to provide a fuller, more realistic picture of all of the solid waste

that is generated, disposed of, and recovered within South Carolina. TSW data is collected from the same sources as MSW.

South Carolina, like many states, has legislation that outlines specific measurement requirements. By law, the state focuses on MSW. See Tables 7.6 to 7.52 in Section 7 for an overview of MSW recycling in the state in FY22. Table 2.1 and 2.2 show the key statistics of SWM in the state in FY22. MSW and TSW tonnages are based on amounts within South Carolina counties only.

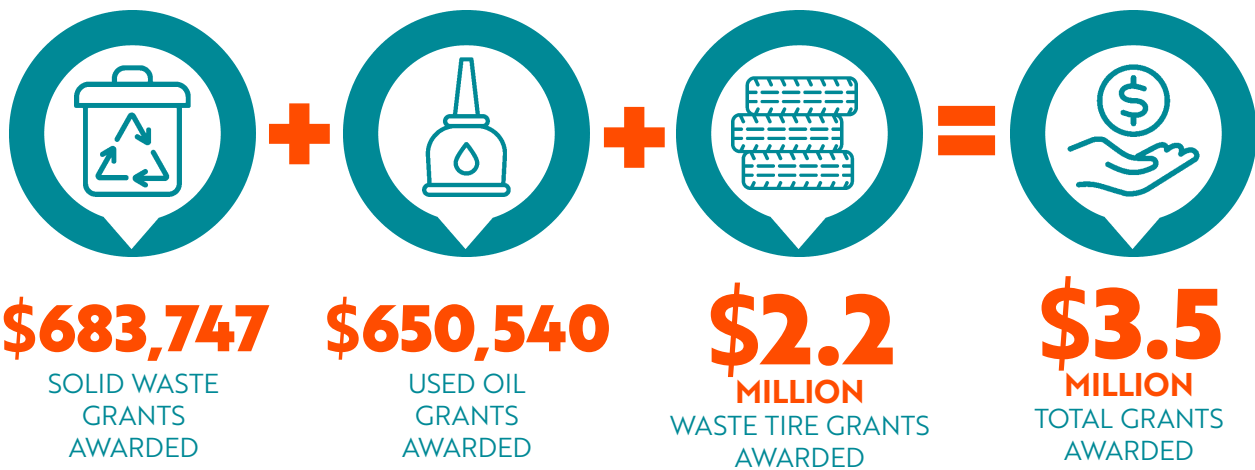

### DHEC's Recycling Grants

The Office of Solid Waste Reduction and Recycling maintains three recycling grant programs that are available to local governments.

- **The Solid Waste Grant** funds can be used for general recycling projects and/or recycling education. In FY22, 58 grants were awarded totaling \$683,747.
- **The Used Oil Grant** funds can be used for used motor oil related recycling. In FY22, 49 grants were awarded totaling \$650,540.
- **The Waste Tire Grant** funds can be used for waste tire stockpile clean-ups, waste tire collection programs and public education. In FY22, 48 grants were awarded totaling \$2,156,953.10.

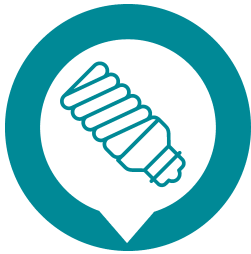

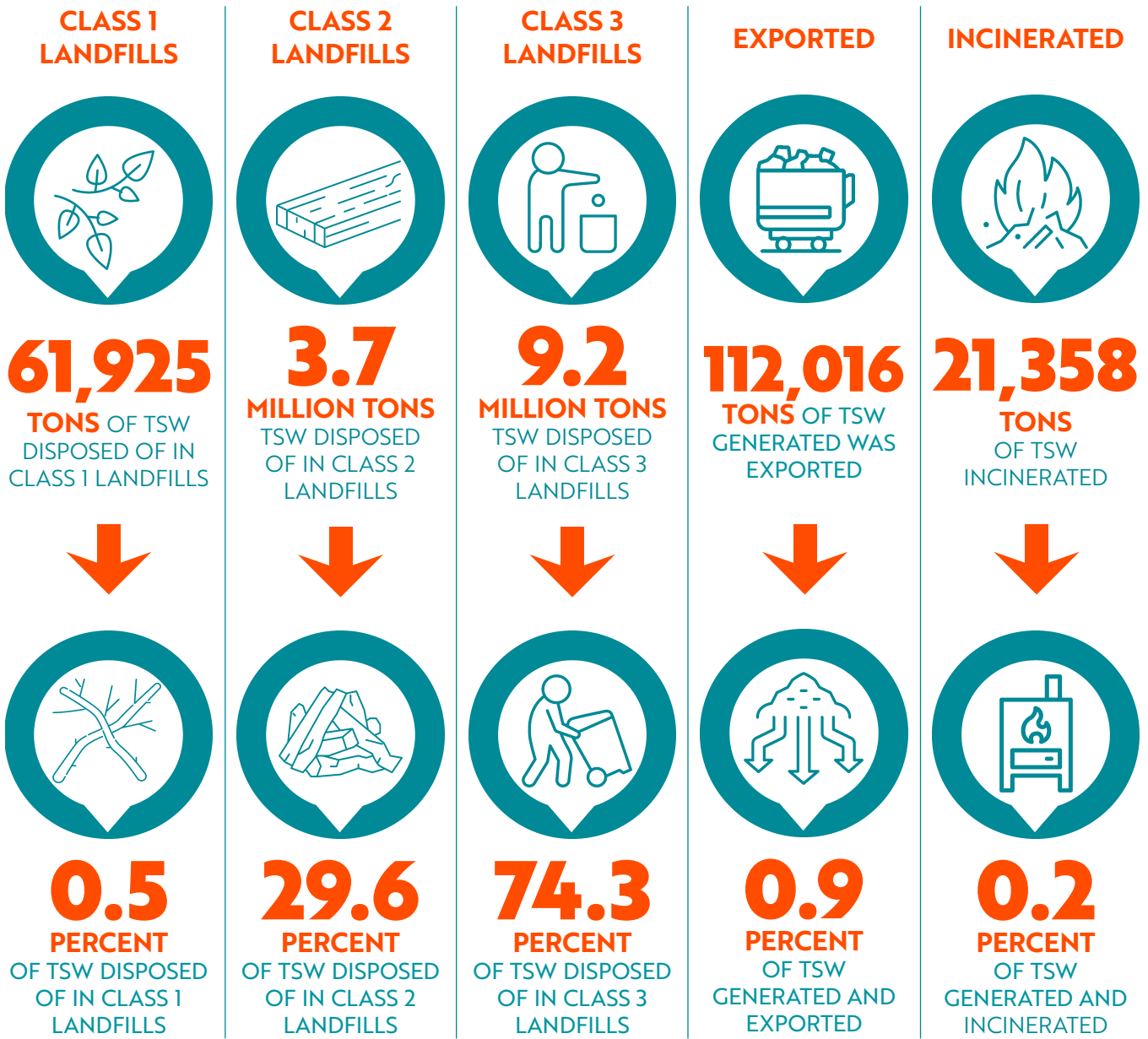

# By the Numbers: TSW Disposal in FY22

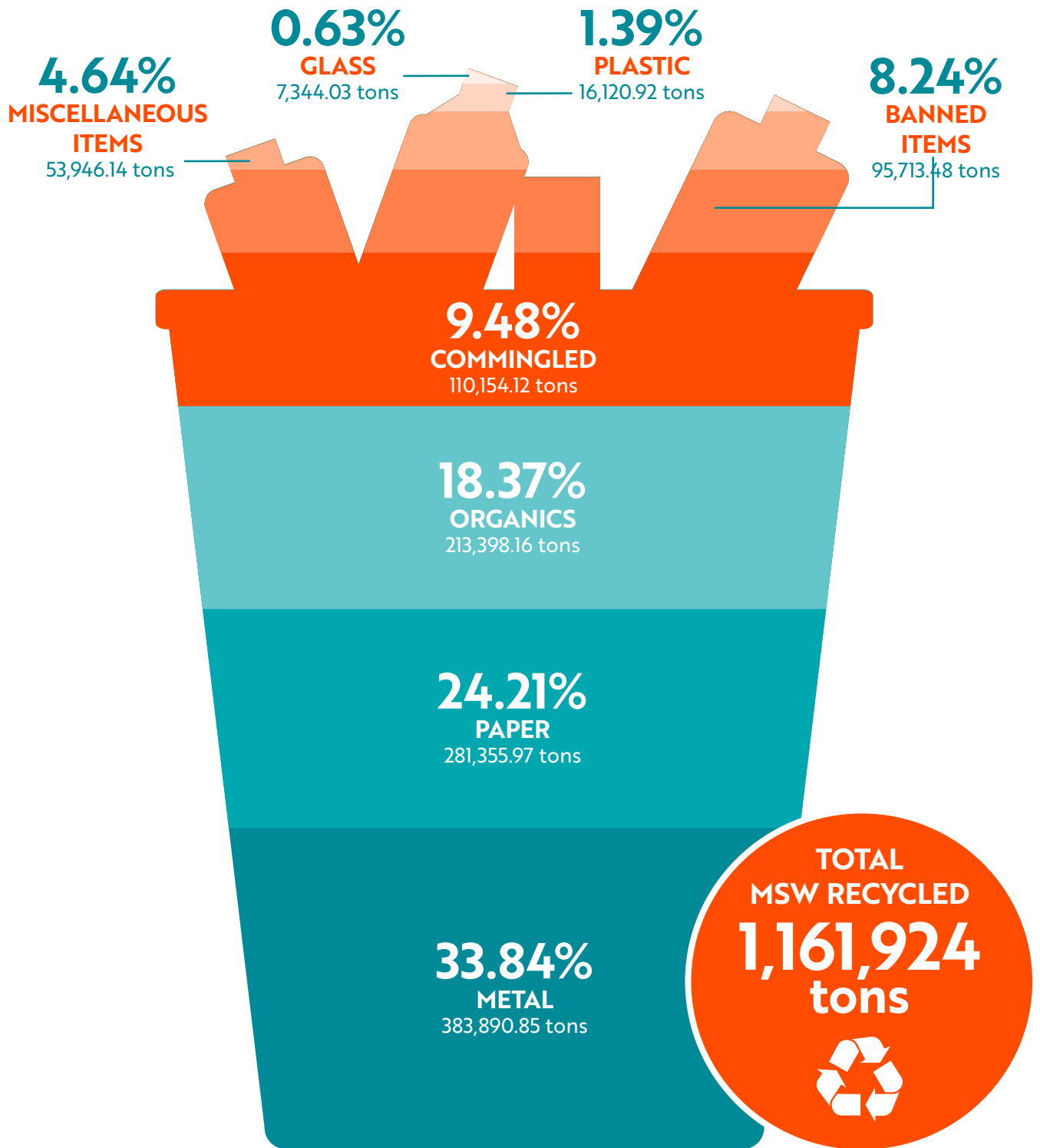


## TSW Disposed Of in Landfills, Incinerated or Exported in FY22

# Solid Waste Planning

## SECTION 3

### State Plan Requirements

DHEC is required by law to maintain a state solid waste management plan (State Plan). The State Plan is required by the Act to address a 20-year planning period and at a minimum include:

- **An inventory of the amounts and types of solid waste currently being disposed of** at solid waste disposal facilities in the state;
- **An estimate of the amount of solid waste that will require disposal at solid waste disposal facilities** in the state for the projected planning period;
- **An estimate of current capacity in the state to manage solid waste** – including the identification of each solid waste management facility or treatment method and a projection of its remaining useful life;
- **An analysis of the types of solid waste facilities that will be needed to manage the state’s solid waste during the projected planning period;** and
- **Recommendations on how to achieve the state’s waste reduction and recycling goals.**

The complete list of requirements for the State Plan may be found in the Act (S.C. Section 44-96-60).



### State Plan Overview

- **On November 27, 1992, DHEC published the first State Plan, pursuant to the Act.** As required by the Act, subsequent annual reports have been developed each FY.
- **In 1998, DHEC adopted EPA’s definition of MSW.**
- **On June 29, 1999, DHEC approved a revised State Plan.** The FY98 annual report and State Plan were approved and published as one document.
- **On February 9, 2006, the State Plan was amended** to include criteria for Research, Development, and Demonstration (RD&D) permitted facilities that utilize emerging technologies.
- **In 2011, the South Carolina Manufacturer Responsibility and Consumer Convenience Information Technology Equipment Collection and Recovery Act (e-Scrap Act) became effective.** This act was passed in order to promote the recycling of electronic devices at the end of their useful life.
- **In 2011, DHEC adopted new state solid waste recycling and reduction goals,** which were to recycle 40 percent or more of the state’s MSW and to reduce the state’s average per capita disposal to 3.25 p/p/d. This goal expired in 2020. The Act [S.C. Section 44-96-50 (F)] requires recycling and waste reduction goals to be revised.
- **In 2021, DHEC announced an updated solid waste recycling goal** with the publication of the FY21 Annual Report. The state’s original reduction goal remained the same. With the adoption of EPA’s new recycling goal – by 2030 and beginning in FY22 – new state solid waste recycling and reduction goals are to recycle 50 percent or more of the state’s MSW and to reduce the state’s average per capita disposal to 3.25 p/p/d.

## DHEC Guidance for Local Plans

The Act is the state law governing solid waste management. Local governments or regions are required to maintain solid waste management plans (local plans) that are consistent with the State Plan.

Each local government or regional plan should address the requirements of the Act in a format chosen by the local government or region. Local government or regional plans should include specific information for the county or member counties and each city, town, or service area located in the county or region.

In general, for a 20-year planning period, local plans should clearly provide for the management of existing, projected, and potential solid waste streams through a combination of reduction, recycling, disposal, and treatment options. How the local government intends to provide for the management of each waste stream should be supported by a discussion of current and future capacity of existing facilities and treatment methods, waste stream projections, and other

factors the local government deems relevant when planning for the management of its solid waste.

Because local governments are responsible for providing for the management of all solid waste, the local plan should include a detailed discussion of each solid waste stream the county or region manages, and could potentially manage, and all the collection, transfer, recycling, treatment, and disposal methods available for each waste stream, for each county, town, and city.

The State Plan and its annual report updates should function as planning tools for local governments for the planning period. When writing and revising county or regional plans, local governments and regional governing bodies should refer to the state's annual report for historical disposal and recycling data reported to DHEC for each county. Local governments should use appropriate local standards when calculating and determining projected solid waste maintenance needs for the planning period.

DHEC maintains copies of local plans in the Division of Mining and Solid Waste Management

### Local Plan Overview

County governments or regions are required to develop local plans that are consistent with the State Plan. These plans should be designed to achieve the current recycling and reduction goals, are required to address a 20-year planning period, and at a minimum include:

- **An estimate of the amount of solid waste being disposed of at solid waste disposal facilities** in the county or region and a projection of the amount of solid waste that will be disposed of at solid waste disposal facilities during the planning period;
- **An estimate of the current capacity within the county or region to manage its solid waste** – including an identification of each solid waste management facility or treatment method and a projection of its remaining useful life;
- **An analysis of existing and new solid waste facilities and treatment methods that will be needed** to manage the county's or region's solid waste during the projected planning period;
- **The designation of a recycling coordinator, description of the recycling program, and outreach/education initiatives;**
- **An outline on how the county or region plans to meet South Carolina's waste reduction and recycling goals;** and
- **An estimate of the cost of implementing the plan.**

The complete list of requirements for local plans may be found in the Act (S.C. Section 44-96-80).

(DMSWM). Solid waste planning, consistency, and demonstration of need (DON) assistance is available from DMSWM.

## Additional DHEC Responsibilities

Beyond the State Plan, DHEC has additional responsibilities including:

- **Determining consistency** with state and local or regional solid waste management plans; and
- **Approving DON** for certain solid waste management facilities.

## CONSISTENCY DETERMINATIONS

Before a solid waste management facility can be permitted, it must be determined by DHEC to be consistent with the State Plan and the local county or regional plan.

DHEC looks at many factors when reviewing the local county or regional plan and making a consistency decision.

## DEMONSTRATION OF NEED (DON)

DON refers to the criteria established for the:

- **Geographical placement;** and
- **Allowable annual disposal rate** of new and expanding solid waste management facilities.

The original DON regulation was put into effect in June 2000. On June 26, 2009, a revision to Regulation 61-107.17 SWM: Demonstration-of-Need became effective.

The DON regulation addresses:

- **Commercial Class 3 landfills;**
- **Commercial Class 2 landfills;**
- **Commercial solid waste incinerators** that incinerate waste other than wood waste or yard trimmings; and
- **Commercial solid waste processing facilities** that process waste destined for disposal at Class 3 landfills.

The DON regulation stipulates that where there are at least two commercial solid waste management facilities of the same type within a specified planning area, no new facility is allowed. Non-commercial facilities are not required to demonstrate need.

The data in Tables 3.2 and 3.3 is used for calculating annual tonnage limits as related to R.61-107.17 effective June 26, 2009. The historical data has been adjusted to reflect changes in the DON regulations.

## CLASS 2 LANDFILLS

Class 2 landfills accept land-clearing debris, industrial process waste, C&D debris, household furniture and animal carcasses under specified conditions. Class 2 landfills have a 20-mile planning radius. (See pages 16-17 for a map detailing Class 2 landfill locations and planning radii.)

DHEC calculates allowable annual disposal at new Class 2 landfills using:

- **100 percent of the host county generation;** and
- **30 percent of the generation in other counties within the planning area.**

Tonnage increases for existing Class 2 facilities are allowed only if the facility is operating within 20 percent of its permitted amount, (i.e., the amount of waste disposed per year is 80 percent or more of the annual permitted capacity).

If a Class 2 landfill qualifies for an increase, it can receive the lesser of:

- **The increased amount of disposal in the planning area** since the last permitted increase; or
- **50,000 tons.**

Class 2 landfills operating on the effective date of the regulation may be allowed variances from certain DON requirements with respect to replacement facilities and expansions. See Table 3.2 for Class 2 waste generated for disposal by county for use in DON.

## CLASS 3 LANDFILLS

Class 3 landfills accept MSW, industrial process waste, sewage sludge, non-hazardous MSW incinerator ash, and other non-hazardous waste. For new commercial Class 3 landfills, allowable tonnage is calculated using:

- **100 percent of the host county generation;** and
- **50 percent of the waste generated in other counties within the planning area.** (None is counted from other counties that have an existing commercial Class 3 landfill.)

Class 3 landfills have a 75-mile planning radius. (See pages 20-21 for a map detailing Class 3 landfill locations and planning radii).

The yearly disposal rate at an existing landfill is allowed to increase only if the facility is within 20 percent of its permitted disposal rate (i.e., the amount of waste disposed of per year is 80 percent or more of the annual permitted capacity).

If a Class 3 landfill qualifies for an increase, it can receive the lesser of:

- **The amount that disposal in South Carolina has increased since the facility last received a permitted increase;** or
- **150,000 tons.**

In addition, the allowable yearly disposal rate at any Class 3 landfill cannot exceed 30 percent of the total solid waste generated in South Carolina that is destined for disposal in Class 3 landfills.

Class 3 landfills operating on the effective date of the regulation are allowed variances from certain DON requirements. See Table 3.3 for Class 3 waste generated for disposal by county for use in DON.

### **SOLID WASTE INCINERATORS**

The yearly throughput for a solid waste incinerator is based on the manufacturer's design of the incinerator, but it cannot exceed 600 tons per day. The DON regulation does not apply to air curtain incinerators that receive only wood waste and yard trimmings. The planning area for a solid waste incinerator is 75 miles. There currently are no permitted MSW incinerators in the state.

### **SOLID WASTE PROCESSING FACILITIES**

The maximum allowable yearly throughput of a solid waste processing facility that processes waste destined for disposal at a Class 3 landfill is equal to:

- **100 percent of the solid waste destined for disposal that is generated in the host county;** and
- **50 percent of the waste generated in each county other than the host county that falls wholly or partially within the 75-mile planning radius.**

See pages 22-23 for a map detailing Class 3 Solid Waste Processing Facility locations and planning radii. Solid Waste processing facilities that process waste destined for recycling or disposal in a Class 1 or Class 2 landfill are not required to demonstrate need.

### **STATE SOLID WASTE REGULATIONS**

Federal, state, and local governments passed and continue to promulgate environmental laws to protect human health and the environment.

EPA is the branch of the federal government that enforces the federal environmental laws and state environmental agencies enforce federal as well as state laws.

DHEC is responsible for writing and enforcing environmental laws and regulations. Solid waste regulations are provided in Table 3.1.

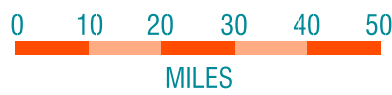
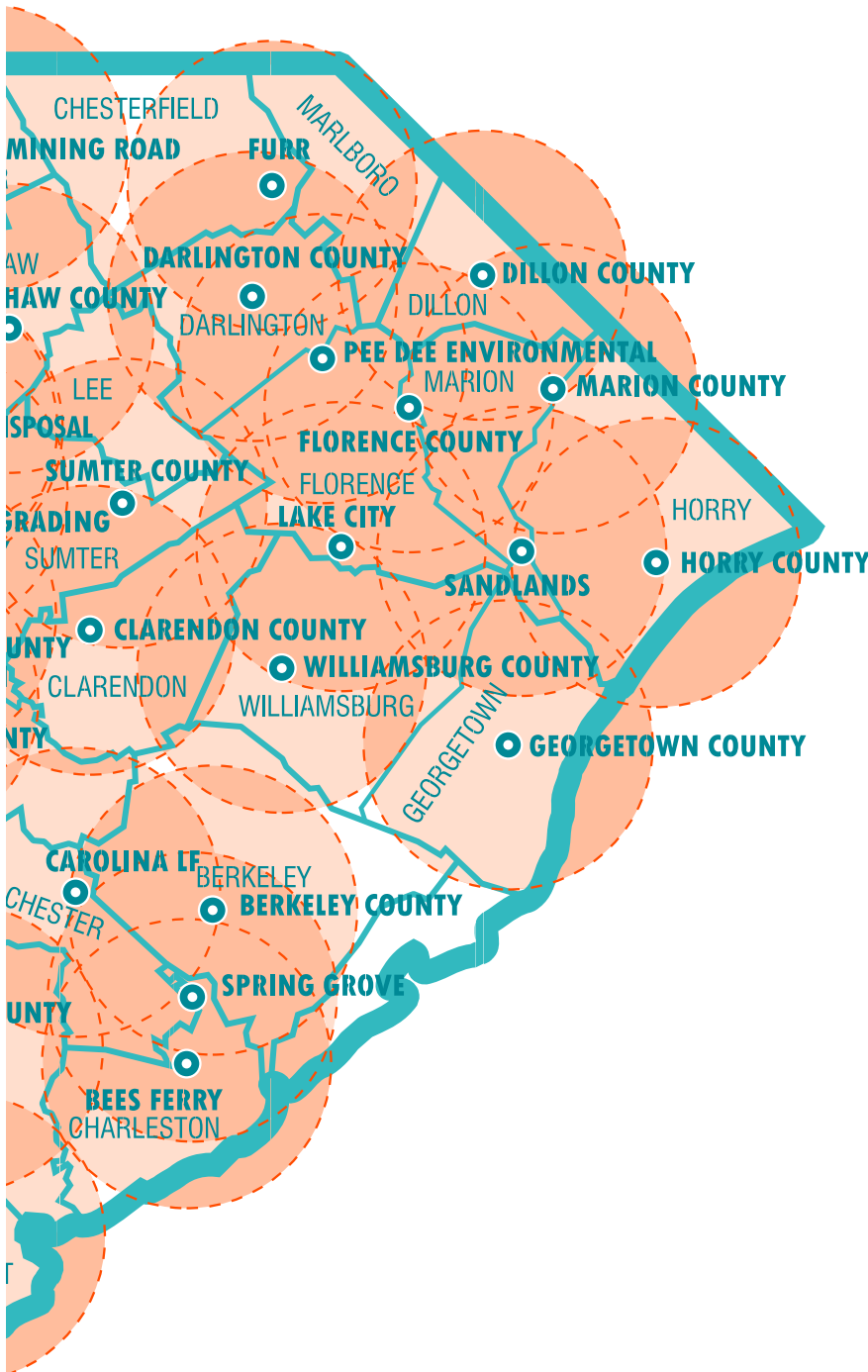

### CLASS 2

- Limits waste streams as specified in Regulation 61-107.19 SWM: Solid Waste Landfills and Structural Fill
- Waste that is characterized as less than 10 times the maximum contaminant level (MCL) and approved by DHEC may be added to the permit for acceptance/disposal

#### Operational Criteria:

- Unauthorized waste may be stored at the facility for 30 days; except that putrescible waste must be removed within 72 hours
- An annual survey to determine landfill capacity used and the remaining permitted capacity may be required
- Require scales – but exempts scales for facilities permitted for less than 10,000 tons per year and on-site landfills

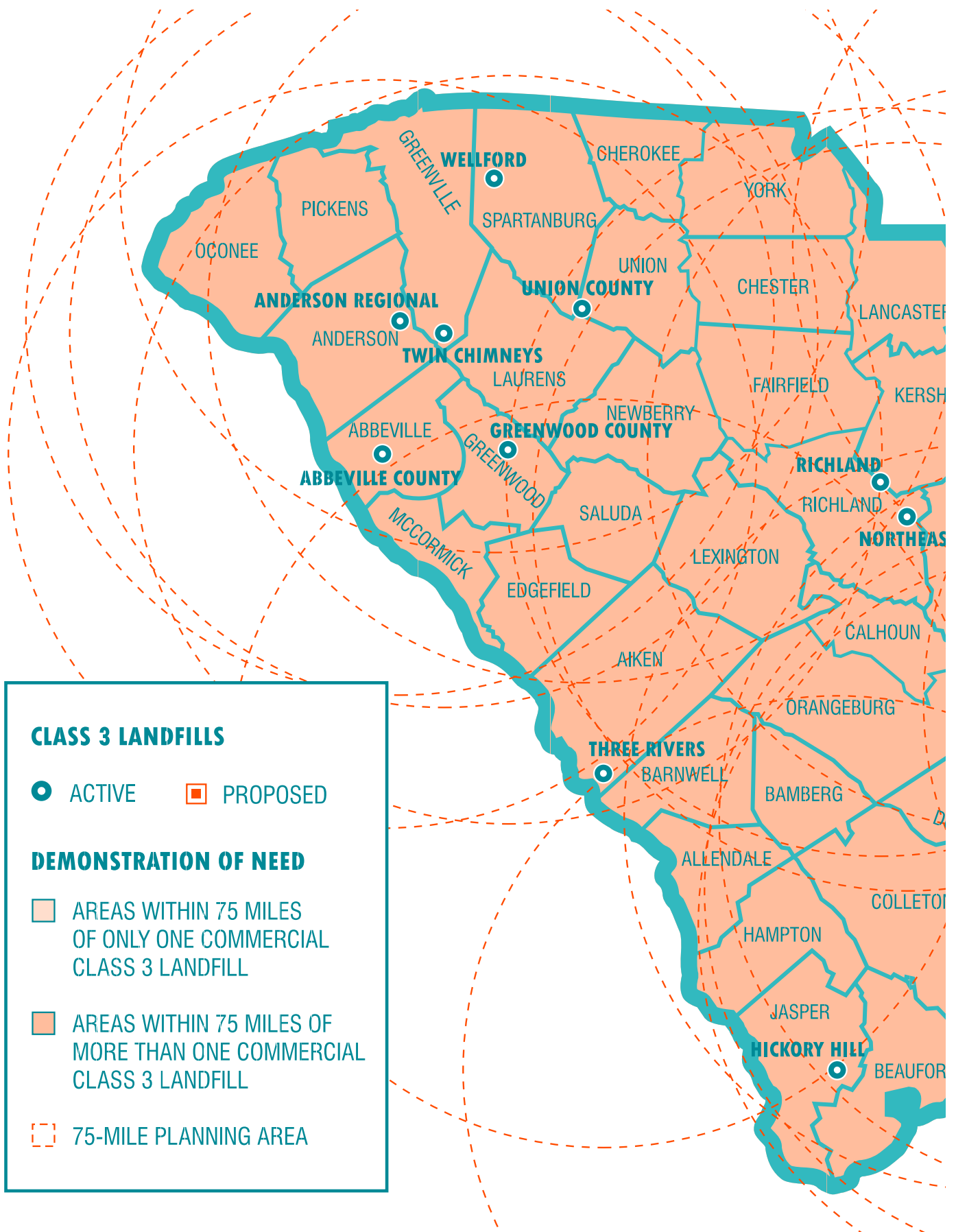
#### Design Criteria:

- Require settlement calculations on the bottom elevation
- Require DHEC to inspect the landfill prior to waste placement
- Set cap requirements at 2 feet of soil
- Establish certain buffers when "Notice of Intent to File a Permit Application" is published
- Require groundwater monitoring and corrective action
- Set post-closure (20 years)
- Require closure and post-closure financial assurance

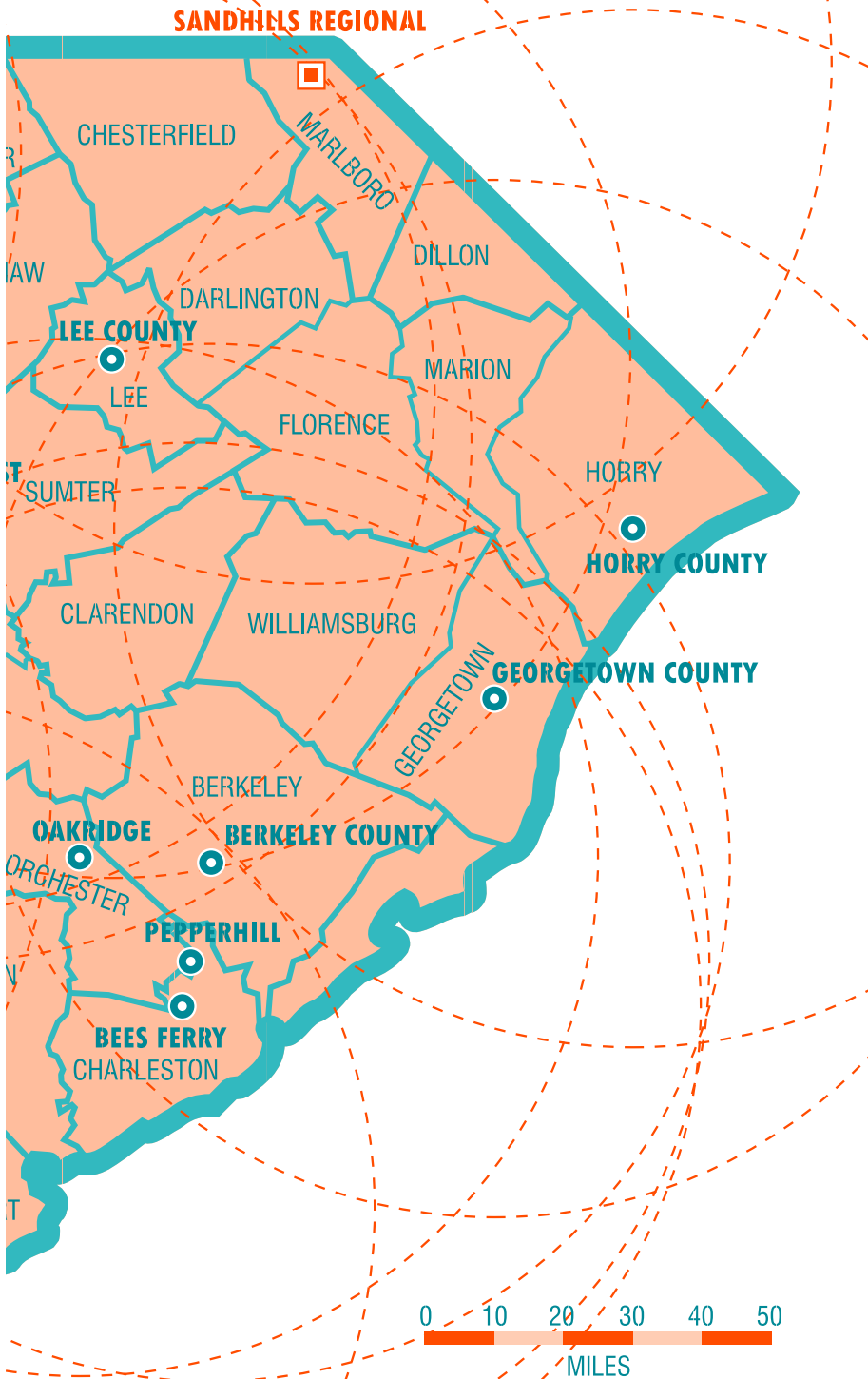

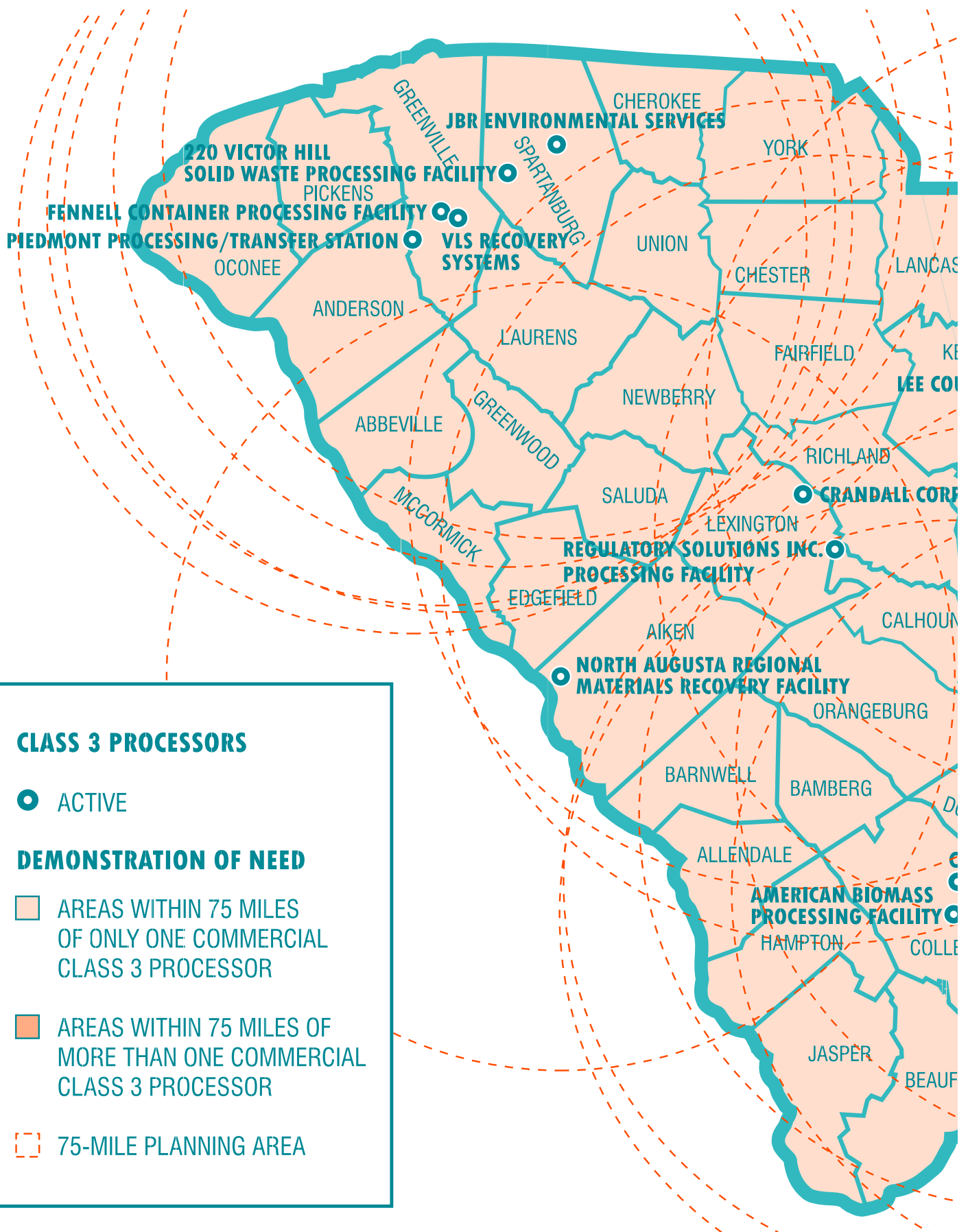


## CLASS 3

- Requires waste characterization through the Special Waste Analysis and Implementation Plan
- Requirement to inspect 10 percent of incoming loads
- Landfills that were permitted as Industrial Solid Waste Landfills prior to the effective date of Regulation 61-107.19 are exempt from design criteria provided the waste streams remain below 30 times the MCLs
- Leachate recirculation allowed under permit modification
- Buffers established when "Notice of Intent to File a Permit Application" is published
- Notification required within 72 hours of receipt of hazardous or PCB waste
- Slope-stability requirements

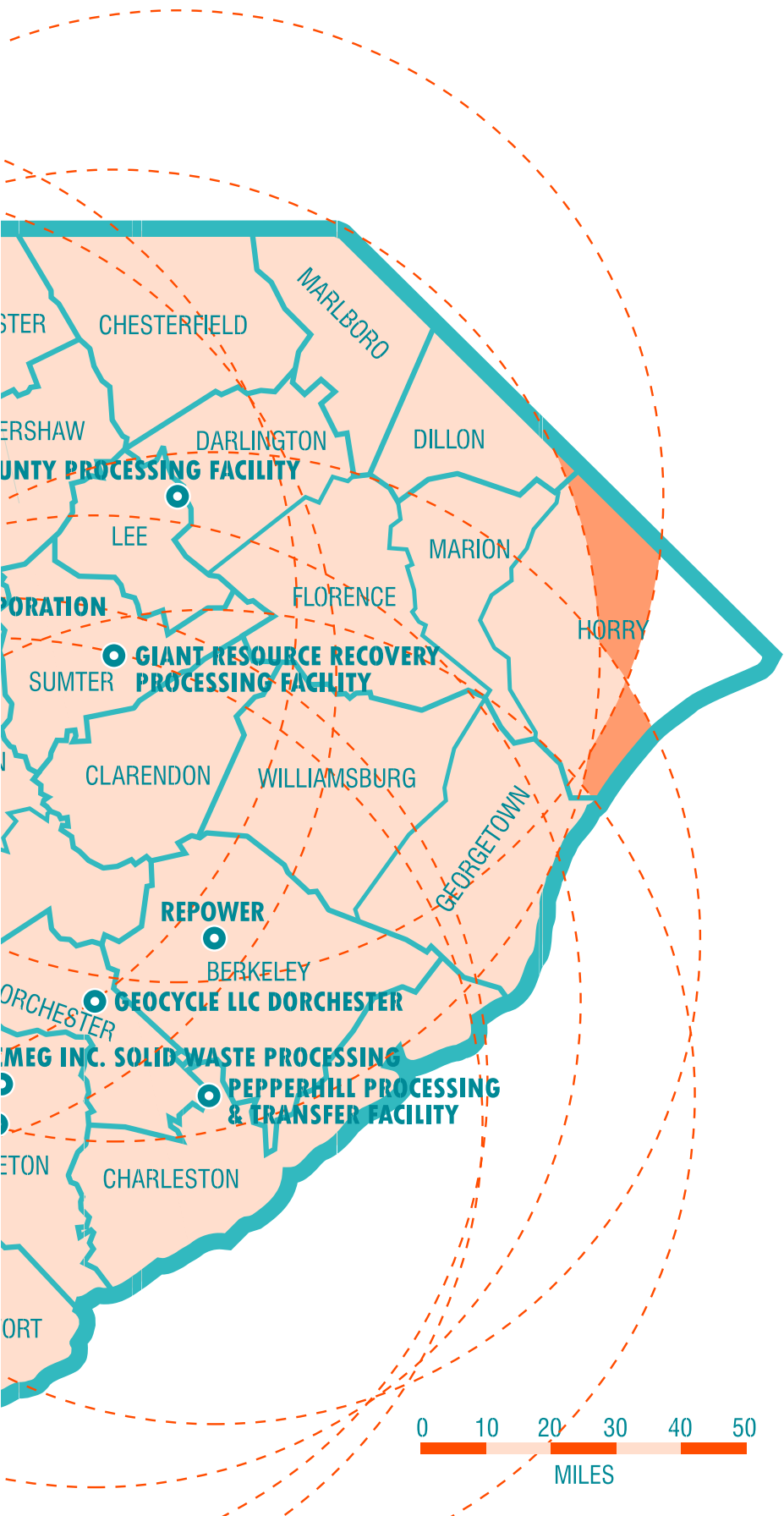

# Permitted Solid Waste Facilities

The Act requires DHEC to compile an inventory of solid waste facilities in this report.

DHEC regulates 12 types of solid waste facilities. Several permits apply to multiple facility types. For example, there are four types of landfills and three types of transfer stations.

Beyond permits, DHEC requires registration for other solid waste activities including lead-acid battery collectors, used oil transporters, waste tire haulers, and C&D debris recyclers. In FY22, South Carolina had 11 types of permitted facilities. See Table 4.1 for more information.

Table 4.2 shows rates of measurement acronyms used in this section. Tables 4.3 to 4.11 provide information on the permitted solid waste facilities by type and include FY22 data on tons received, permitted rates, and storage limits. Landfills are addressed in Section 5.

## Composting & Wood-Grinding Facilities

These facilities convert land-clearing debris, yard trimmings, and/or organics residuals into compost and mulch. Type is determined by feedstock.



Facility types include:

- **TYPE 1 FACILITIES** grind or compost only source separated organic residuals described as Category 1 feedstocks;
- **TYPE 2 FACILITIES** compost only source separated compostable materials described as Category 2 feedstocks or mixtures of Category 1 and Category 2 feedstocks; and
- **TYPE 3 FACILITIES** compost Category 3 feedstocks or mixtures of Category 3 feedstocks with other feedstock categories.

All feedstocks are listed in the Appendix in R.61-107.4 SWM: Compost and Mulch Production from Land-Clearing Debris, Yard Trimmings, and Organic Residuals.

## Solid Waste Transfer Stations

These facilities accept and transfer solid waste from collection vehicles to larger vehicles for movement to another facility prior to its processing and disposal.

As of June 30, 2022, there were 56 permitted transfer stations – one Class 1, seven Class 2, and 38 Class 3 – located across 30 counties.

## C&D Debris

C&D debris is non-hazardous solid waste generated during the construction, remodeling, repair, or demolition of homes, buildings, roads, and bridges. C&D debris – as outlined in the Act – is not part of MSW. It is measured, however, given the sheer

amount of material generated. Registered C&D debris recyclers are required to report to DHEC each calendar year while other solid waste facilities report each fiscal year.

In FY22, a reported 722,732 tons of C&D debris was recovered for reuse. See Table 4.6 for additional information.

## Solid Waste Processing Facilities

Processors reduce or alter the volume and chemical or physical characteristics of solid waste through processes such as shredding, baling, sorting, or bulking waste. These actions result in the generation of a new waste stream. The newly generated waste stream is then delivered to a recycling, treatment, or disposal facility.

## Waste Tire Facilities

There are two types of waste tire facilities in the state – collectors and processors. Processors recover reusable by-products from waste tires or cut, burn, or alter waste tires so the tires are no

## Used Oil

There are two types of used oil facilities – processors and burners. Processors are operations designed to produce or make used oil more

amenable for production of fuel oils, lubricants, and other products. Burners refer to facilities that burn off-specification used oil for energy recovery. In FY22, there were 12 facilities in eight counties as seen in Table 4.8.

### Structural Fill

A structural fill is the filling of a natural low-lying area with land-clearing debris, hardened concrete/ cured asphalt, bricks, and/or masonry blocks for future beneficial use. These fills may not provide a structural base for building purposes. In FY22, there were 8 permitted structural fills as seen in Table 4.9.

### Land Application & Soil Treatment Facilities

Land application permits refer to builders, farmers, and others that place non-hazardous solid waste on or into soil that is being used for agricultural, silvicultural, and horticultural beneficial purposes and not as a means of disposal. In FY22, there were six facilities located in six counties as shown in Table 4.10.

Soil treatment facilities treat contaminated (e.g., by petroleum) soil. In FY22, there was one facility permitted as shown in Table 4.10.

### Incinerators

There are two types of incinerators – solid waste and air curtain. Currently, there are no permitted solid waste incinerators in the state.

Air curtain incinerators are used to reduce the volume of land-clearing debris. All four air curtain incinerators were located in two neighboring counties as seen in Table 4.11.

# Landfills & Disposal

The Act and subsequent regulation require permitted public and private solid waste facilities to report to DHEC the amount and type of solid waste disposed of, incinerated, or exported.

The types of solid waste measured are:

- **MSW** as defined in the Act; and
- **TSW** is all solid waste disposed of including MSW, C&D debris, ash, industrial process waste, processed tires, and land-clearing debris.

Almost all solid waste not recovered is disposed of in landfills with a small amount incinerated or exported.

In FY22, South Carolina had 138 permitted solid waste landfills as seen in Table 5.1. Tables 5.3 to 5.14 show all disposal information for FY22.

## MSW

Table 5.2 provides the sources of generation and types of material included in MSW. MSW is the second largest component of TSW. Here are key

takeaways on MSW disposal from FY22:

- **The amount of MSW disposed of was 3,951,239 tons** – an increase of 178,957 tons (5 percent) from FY21;
- **Overall, 77 percent of the MSW generated in South Carolina was disposed of** – the remainder being recycled; and
- **The state’s MSW disposal rate rose to 4.2 p/p/d from 4.0 p/p/d from FY21.**

## TSW

TSW accounts for all solid waste generated, disposed of, and recovered (e.g., MSW, C&D debris, ash, processed tires, industrial process waste, land-clearing debris, natural disaster debris, other waste) from all sources. In turn, TSW provides a more representative picture of solid waste in South Carolina.

Here are key takeaways on TSW disposal from FY22.

- **The amount of TSW generated** (disposed of and recycled) **was 16,554,549 million tons in FY22.**
- **About 13.0 million tons were disposed of, incinerated or exported.**
- **3.7 million tons disposed of in Class 2 landfills and 61,925 tons disposed of in Class 1 landfills.**



## Imported & Exported Solid Waste

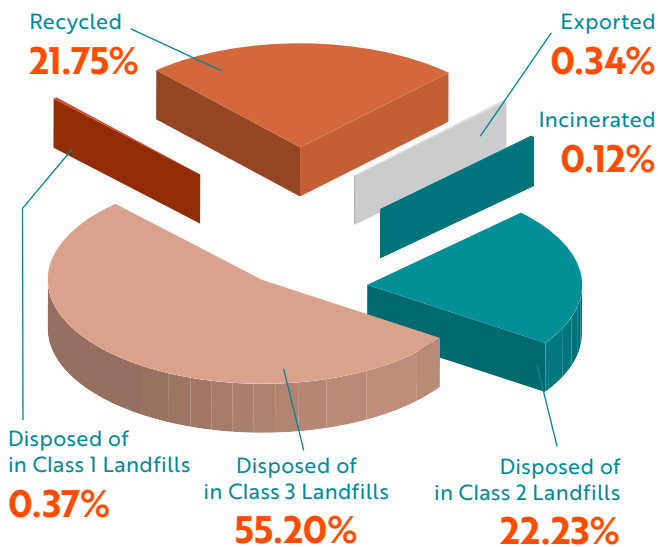
South Carolina both imports and exports solid waste. The vast majority of imported solid waste is MSW but may include other material. The majority of all solid waste is disposed of in Class 3 landfills. For reporting purposes, imported solid waste is not counted as part of the state's solid waste generation since the waste is generated out of the state. Waste generated in South Carolina and waste exported to other states is counted.



Here are key takeaways on the import and export of solid waste in FY22.

- **South Carolina accepted 607,401 tons of out-of-state solid waste for disposal in Class 3 landfills.**
- **Solid waste was imported from Georgia, Massachusetts, North Carolina, and New York.**
- **In comparison, South Carolina exported 55,587 tons of TSW in FY22** from Chester, Lancaster, and York to other out-of-state waste facilities.

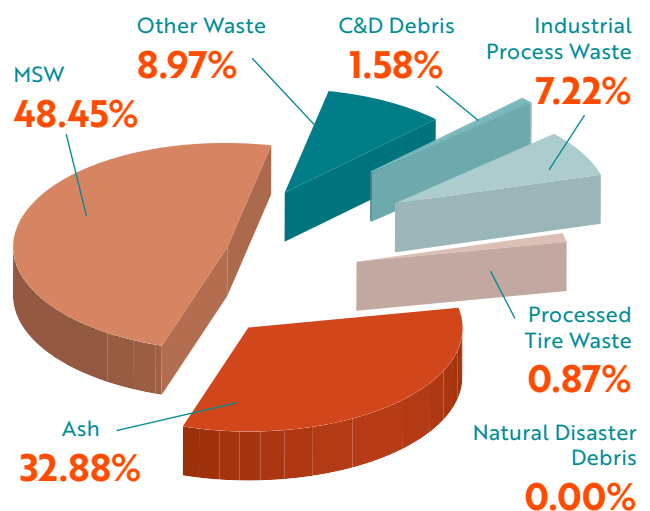
**CHART 5.4: TSW Generated by South Carolina in FY22**

## Class 1 Landfills

Only land-clearing debris can be disposed of in Class 1 landfills. However, land-clearing debris can also be disposed of in Class 2 landfills.

The amount of material disposed of in Class 1 landfills was 61,925 tons – a decrease of 28,471 tons from FY21. See Table 5.8 for more information.



## Class 2 Landfills

Class 2 landfills accept three types of waste:

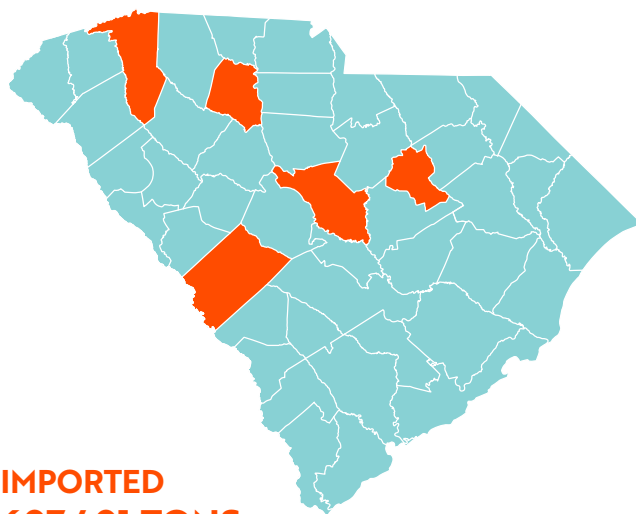
1. **C&D debris;**
2. **Land-clearing debris** (e.g., trees, stumps, wood chips generated from land-clearing activities, yard trimmings that have not come into contact with petroleum products or hazardous constituents); and
3. **Industrial process waste** (e.g., scraps and by-products from the manufacturing process).

In FY22, the amount of solid waste disposed of in Class 2 landfills was 3,679,431 tons – an increase of 212,277 tons from FY21. See Table 5.9 for more information.

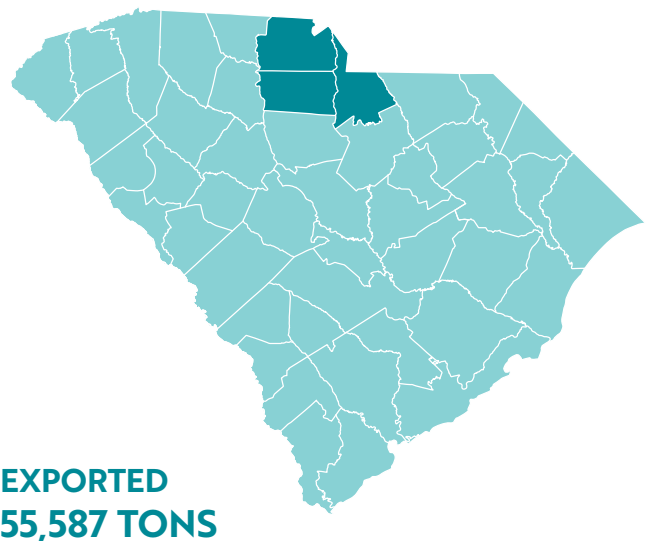
## Class 3 Landfills

Class 3 landfills are identified as commercial or non-commercial – with the latter designation signifying that landfill only accepts waste generated on-site under the same ownership or control of the facility. Class 3 landfills accepted MSW, C&D debris, and industrial process waste. See Figure 5.10 on page 36 for a map of Class 3 landfill locations at the close of FY22.

## Tipping Fees

Here are the average fees calculated from the reported data for FY22:

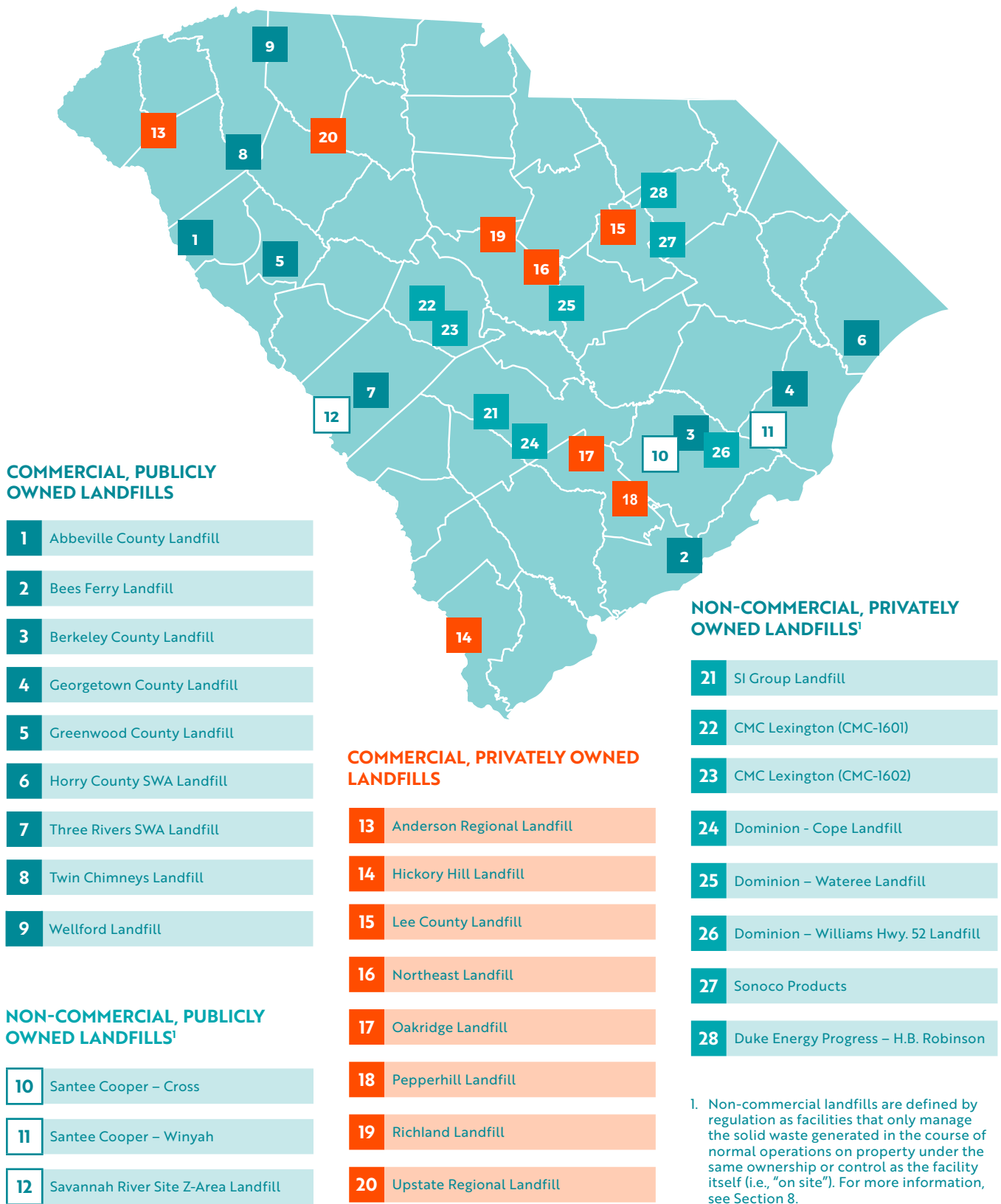
- **Class 1: \$7/ton** – Of the 32 permitted Class 1 landfills, 11 reported an average tipping fee;
- **Class 2: \$32/ton** – Of the 79 permitted Class 2 landfills, 49 reported an average fee; and
- **Class 3: \$46/ton** – Of the 17 Class 3 commercial landfills required to report tipping fees, 16 facilities reported fees.

# Recycling by Commodity

SECTION  
**6**

The Act prioritizes MSW and the safe, efficient, and environmentally responsible management of it. The Act defines MSW and what items must be measured and counted toward the state’s waste reduction goals.

South Carolina measures recycled MSW by the categories listed below. Each of the eight categories is comprised of specific items (i.e., commodities).

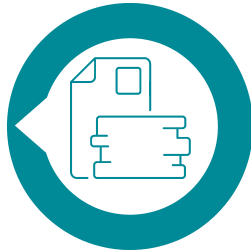
**1 Glass** is a traditionally accepted recyclable that includes containers and packaging (e.g., brown/amber, clear/flint, green, mixed), and glass from furniture and electronics. However, glass has recently been less accepted by programs due to markets.



**2 Metal** is a traditionally accepted recyclable that includes aluminum cans, ferrous, non-ferrous, steel cans, and other mixed scrap metal.



**3 Paper** is a traditionally accepted recyclable that includes cardboard, magazines, mixed paper, newspaper and inserts, office paper, and paperboard.



**4 Plastic** is a traditionally accepted recyclable that includes PET (#1), HDPE (#2), vinyl (#3), LDPE (#4), PP (#5), PS (#6), commingled PET and HDPE, and other mixed plastic.



**5 Banned items** are listed in the Act or other legislation and cannot be disposed of and must be recycled. Those items include appliances, electronics, lead-acid batteries, used motor oil, and whole tires. Yard trimmings are banned from Class 3 landfills, but may be disposed of in Class 1 or Class 2 landfills.



**6 Miscellaneous items** include antifreeze, cooking oil, fluorescent bulbs, hazardous household material, inkjet/toner cartridges, mattresses, paint, rechargeable batteries, textiles, used motor oil filters, and wood packaging as well as other specialty items. These items vary by program.



**7 Organics** include yard trimmings and food waste. Yard trimmings are banned from Class 3 landfills but may be disposed of in Class 1 or Class 2 landfills. This year, yard trimmings made into mulch or compost and used as alternative daily cover were counted as recycled material.



**8 Commingled items** – also known as single stream – are recyclable items collected together, not sorted by type.

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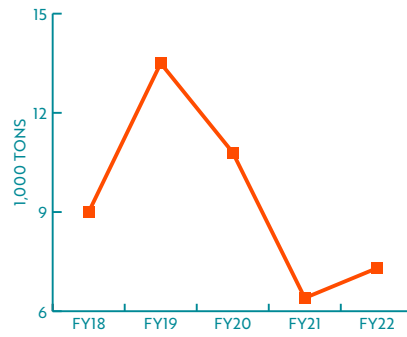

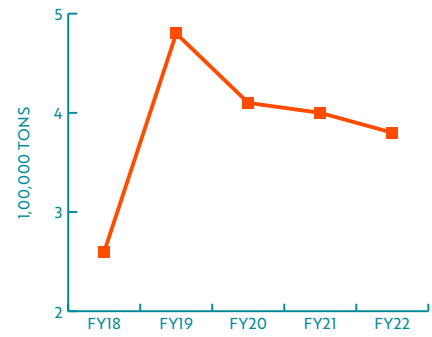

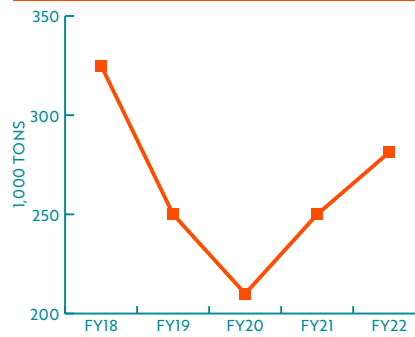
**FIGURE 6.9: Glass Recycled by FY**



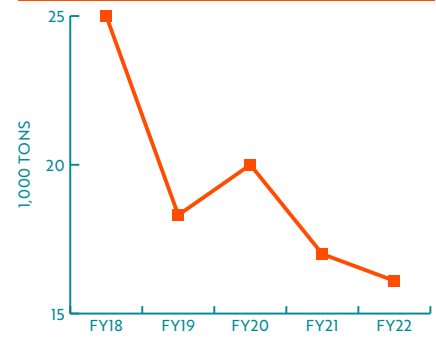
**FIGURE 6.10: Metal Recycled by FY**



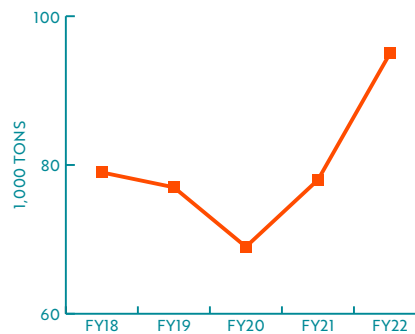
**FIGURE 6.11: Paper Recycled by FY**



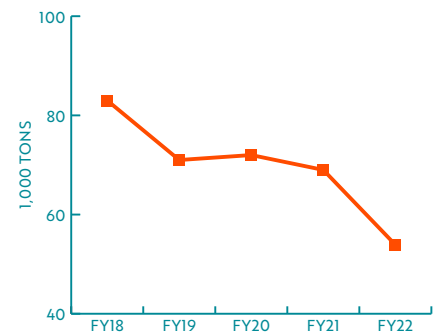
**FIGURE 6.12: Plastic Recycled by FY**



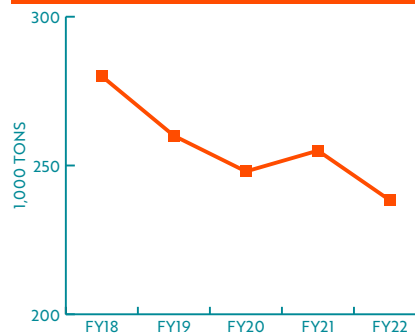
**FIGURE 6.13: Banned Items Recycled by FY**



**FIGURE 6.14: Miscellaneous Items Recycled by FY**



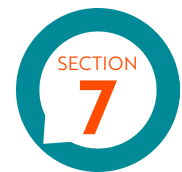
**FIGURE 6.15: Organics Recycled by FY**

# Recycling by State & County



Counties are required by the Act to submit annual reports to DHEC providing the amount and type of MSW recycled each FY.

See Tables 7.1 and 7.2 for an MSW residential recycling state overview from FY22.

South Carolina has a 50 percent or more MSW recycling goal and 3.25 p/p/d or less disposal rate goal.

Since FY01, South Carolina has recycled more than 25 million tons of MSW. In FY22:

- **Two counties - Laurens and Marlboro** – met the recycling rate goal of 50 percent or more MSW recycled; and
- **22 counties – Abbeville, Aiken, Allendale, Anderson, Chesterfield, Clarendon, Darlington, Hampton, Jasper, Kershaw, Lancaster, Laurens, Lexington, Marlboro, McCormick, Marion, Pickens, Richland, Sumter, Union, Williamsburg, and York** – met the disposal rate goal of 3.25 pounds per person per day (p/p/d) or less.

Figure 7.3 highlights the counties that met the waste reduction goal. Laurens and Marlboro met both goals in FY22.

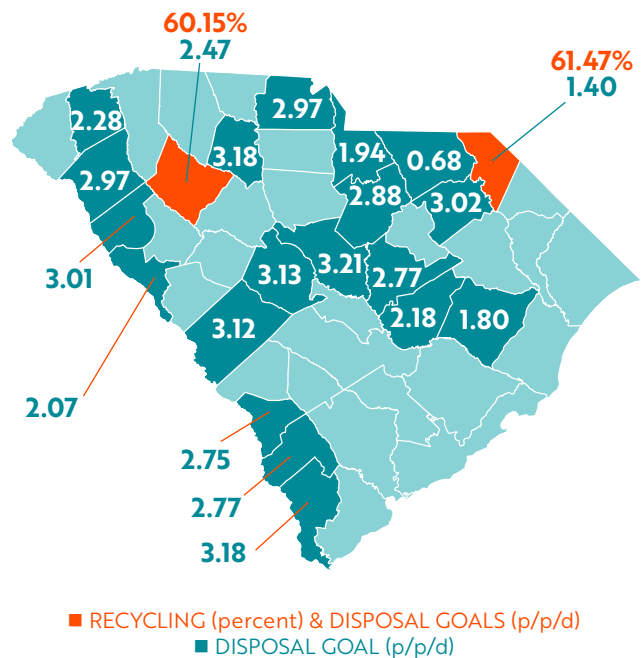

# Improving Solid Waste Management



## Recommendations for FY22

### 1 Complete a wide-ranging waste characterization analysis.

In the 31 years since the passage of the Act, DHEC has not conducted a thorough analysis of waste generated in South Carolina. Instead, it has relied on data collected by local governments, EPA, and independent organizations.



Understanding what makes up South Carolina's waste is essential for planning – a first step in devising strategies, priorities, and goals to prevent and reduce waste, recover more material, develop successful recycling markets, and conserve resources.

The analysis should be comprehensive to not only include the traditional statewide MSW stream (e.g., aluminum, cardboard, glass, paper, plastic, steel, food waste), but under-addressed commodities such as C&D debris and tires as well as newer commodities like solar panels and rechargeable batteries. The addition of C&D debris means audits will need to be conducted at both Class 3 and Class 2 landfills. Recycling markets also need to be addressed.

### 2 Update the State Plan.

The Act (Section 44-96-60) requires DHEC to develop and maintain a comprehensive State Plan for managing solid waste generated in South Carolina. In turn, county governments or regions must develop and maintain solid waste management plans consistent with the State Plan.



The State Plan is essential. It is the foundation for the work that must be done to manage solid waste in a socially, economically, and environmentally responsible manner. It establishes the framework, goals, priorities, strategies, and overall direction of these efforts.

Although the annual report is considered an update of the State Plan, a thorough revision of the State Plan has not been done since 1999. Solid waste management has changed dramatically since then and the State Plan needs revision to reflect these changes in commodities, technology, and markets.

The revision should be coordinated with the completion of the waste characterization analysis allowing DHEC and other stakeholders to evaluate the data collected. This two-step approach will provide South Carolina the information to plan smartly to address the next decade.

### 3 Address challenges facing scrap tire management.

South Carolina's scrap tire management program has been a success since its beginning in fiscal year 1994 (July 1, 1993 to June 30, 1994) – with counties recovering more than 110 million tires from current generation and stockpiles.



The end-of-life management of scrap tires is addressed in the Act (Section 44-96-170), which bans the landfill disposal of whole tires and places a \$2 fee on the purchase of new tires for the proper management of scrap tires.

Nearly 30 years later, two key issues have emerged that threaten the program: insufficient funding and limited markets.

1. **Current funding cannot match the significant increasing costs for the collection, hauling, and processing of waste tires** – resulting in a spiraling price tag for county governments. These increased costs will limit scrap tire collection services and/or force moving funding from traditional recycling programs to offset the increase.
2. **Recycling markets are limited.** Markets such as tire-derived fuel, crumb rubber, and civil engineering applications are available with emerging technologies on the horizon, but most are not economically feasible and/or face resistance from various stakeholders.



These issues are being addressed with the reconvening of stakeholders via the S.C. Scrap Tire Sustainability Coalition. This work is a priority and needs to continue until solutions are found.

#### 4 Maximize food waste reduction and recovery.

Food waste is the No.1 material Americans throw away. In fact, the United States discards more food than any other country in the world – nearly 80 billion pounds every year. That’s estimated to be 30-40 percent of the nation’s entire food supply.



Wasted food wastes resources. Any labor, energy, water, land and other resources used to produce, package and move food from the farm to our plates are lost. In addition, wholesome food that could have helped families in need is lost. Also lost is the money spent to buy food that is never eaten.

To address this issue, DHEC created the Don’t Waste Food SC (DWFSC) campaign to raise awareness of the negative economic, environmental and social impact of food waste. DWFSC addresses all producers of food waste, but has priority focus on where the most food waste is generated – at home.

Food waste, however, is a problem with solutions. Here are basic recommendations.

- **Continue to promote the DWFSC campaign.**
- **Use the data from the waste characterization analysis (see first recommendation) to re-evaluate plans to meet EPA’s food waste reduction goal.**
- **Increase consumer education and outreach efforts.** Clarify and communicate information on food storage, food date labels, and food donation.
- **DHEC and the S.C. Department of Education must increase efforts to minimize food waste in the school meals program.**
- **DHEC must continue to provide technical assistance, curriculum lessons, and other educational material as well as grant funding**

**to implement reduction and composting initiatives at schools.**

- **Encourage food waste prevention and recovery by businesses.**
- **DHEC must continue to assist and provide grant funding to local governments to implement reduction and organics recovery.** This should include backyard composting, potential government programs, and government support to commercial composting facilities.
- **In partnership with the S.C. Department of Commerce Recycling Market Development program and other stakeholders, grow commercial organics recovery infrastructure.**

### Legislative Update for FY22

Each year, South Carolina continues to strengthen solid waste management within the state.

Some key pieces of legislation have been discussed in the past year.

- **Electronics** – Revisions to the S.C. Manufacturer Responsibility and Consumer Convenience and Recovery Act went into effect June 17, 2022. Revisions to the law include extending the sunset date and shifting manufacturer electronic obligations to a convenience standard.
- **Solar Panels** – Act 119 instructed DHEC to submit regulations for the management of the end-of-life photovoltaic modules and energy storage system batteries on solar projects in excess of thirteen acres. The stakeholder process has been ongoing since 2022 and a draft regulation is expected to be introduced in the 2024 legislative session.

**SMART BUSINESS RECYCLING PROGRAM** is a free, voluntary program designed to:



- **Help South Carolina companies reduce the environmental impact** of their operations;
- **Provide technical assistance to help businesses begin or expand green practices** such as waste reduction, recycling, composting, energy and water conservation and environmentally preferred purchasing; and
- **Recognize businesses** for their recycling and sustainability efforts with an annual awards program.

**TAKE ACTION SC ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP** is designed to inform, inspire and empower students and teachers to protect and preserve the environment. The program offers lessons, support material, teacher workshops and classroom presentations to promote composting, recycling, waste reduction, litter prevention and sustainability.



The centerpiece of the program is DHEC's "Action for a Cleaner Tomorrow: A South Carolina Environmental Curriculum Supplement" ("Action"). The partnership is comprised of Coastal Carolina University, Palmetto Pride, Keep South Carolina Beautiful, S.C. Energy Office and DHEC. **GREEN GOVERNMENT INITIATIVE** provides assistance to state agencies in order for them to lead by example and operate in an environmentally-responsible manner. Services provided include:



- **Technical assistance to support, improve or expand state agency waste reduction and recycling programs;**
- **Signage, posters and other material to promote programs;**
- **Current information about recycled-content product vendors and state contracts;**
- **Quarterly newsletters and workshops;**
- **S.C. State Agency Recycling Professionals Certification;** and
- **Recognition through an annual awards program.**

**RECYCLE U** offers free, non-regulatory services to colleges and universities in South Carolina that includes:



- **Site visits to assess waste reduction, reuse and recycling successes and opportunities;**
- **Technical assistance including phone/email consultations, research and contacts for potential markets, service providers and beneficial reuse;** and
- **The S.C. Collegiate Recycling Professionals Certification and other workshops.**

**GRANT PROGRAMS** continue to be an integral part of the Office's services. The Office awards annual funding to S.C. local governments, schools and colleges/universities. In FY22, the grant program offered six types of grants totaling more than \$3.6 million. Those grants included the following:

- **Solid Waste Grants** issued to 58 local governments for general recycling;
- **Waste Tire Grants** issued to 48 local governments for waste tire recycling expenses. A special Waste Tire Stockpile Grant was issued to Anderson County for the cleanup of a former tire processing facility;
- **Used Oil Grants** issued to 49 local governments for expenses related to used oil recycling;
- **Collegiate Recycling Grants** included 12 grants to colleges and universities; and
- **Recycling Education Grants** issued to 26 K-12 schools.
