

In support of improving patient care, Southeast AIDS Education and Training Center is jointly accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME), the

Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE), and the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC), to provide continuing education for the healthcare team.




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The purpose of PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) Awareness Week is to increase PrEP awareness, access, and uptake in South Carolina. The first HIV antiretroviral medication used to prevent HIV was approved by the FDA in 2012, but in 2023 South Carolina still has limited PrEP uptake. As reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in 2022, South Carolina had over 10,000 individuals eligible for PrEP, but only 3,500 individuals were prescribed PrEP. Please join us for daily webinars to learn more about prescribing PrEP.

This event supports South Carolina's Ending the Epidemics (EtE) initiative, a statewide campaign to eliminate new cases of HIV, STDs, viral hepatitis, and substance use disorders by 2030. PrEP Awareness Week activities include webinars for providers, sexual health sessions for college students, and FREE HIV/STD testing.
